MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING FOR PRIVATELY FUNDED GIRL'S SOFTBALL AND BOY'S CROSS COUNTRY

This Memorandum of Understanding is entered into by Lewistown School District No. 1, hereafter referred to as "the District" and the Girl's Fastpitch Softball/Boy's Cross Country Association, hereafter referred to as "the Association" for the purpose of delineating the responsibilities in maintaining and privately funding girl's softball and boy's cross country as Montana High School Association (MHSA) sanctioned sports at Fergus High School.

The District shall be responsible for the entire operation of the MHSA-sanctioned girl's softball and boy's cross country programs. These responsibilities include but are not limited to the following:

- Securing a contract with the District #9 Softball Association and the Lewistown Park and Recreation Department.
- Selection and evaluation of coaches.
- Selection of team members.
- Determining the event scheduling.
- Providing arrangements for individual competitions and meets including food, lodging, and transportation.
- Each programs awards.
- The District shall charge athletes a participation fee with the revenue being deposited in the District's activity account.
- Fergus High School will be responsible ticket collection with gate revenue to be deposited with the District. Funds collected will be used to reduce the Association's annual assessment.

The District will maintain the program in accordance with the rules and regulations established by the Lewistown Public Schools Board of Trustees, the Montana High School Association and Fergus High School.

The Association's responsibility will be to raise funds for the purpose of financing the girl's softball and boy's cross country programs and managing the home field and events under the direction of Fergus High School's athletic director. These responsibilities include, but are not limited to the following:

- Said funds shall be deposited with Fergus High School as follows: The Association will make an initial deposit of \$25,000.00 by October 15, 2008. Thereafter, by March 1st following the completion of each season, the Association will assure that the minimum account balance is equal to the last year's actual expenses plus 10%. Failure to meet the March 1st fiscal deadline will immediately terminate girl's softball and boys' cross country as school-sanctioned sports.
- The Association shall be responsible for field preparation, concession workers, scorekeepers, and announcers. The Association will retain the revenue from concessions

and general fundraising efforts. The Association shall be the sole trust of said revenue, and at the appropriate time, will use these funds toward its annual assessment.

• The Association shall assist Fergus High School administration with crowd management.

Due to the unique relationship of these privately funded school activities the Association clearly understands and is aware of the following:

- The Association will have no input regarding the general operations of the girl's softball and boy's cross country programs at the high school.
- All costs charged to the Association's fund will be at the sole discretion of the District, but should reflect agreed upon expenses of the programs.
- Should any of the financial arrangements ever need to be changed, it shall be at the initiative of the Lewistown Public Schools Board of Trustees, not by a petition from the Association.

In the event that the Association or the District elect to discontinue girl's softball and boy's cross country as Fergus High School sports, the balance of funds after all expenses have been paid shall be returned to the Association upon the District's receipt of a written directive by the Association's board of directors.

We the undersigned, as officers of the Girl's Fastpitch Softball/Boy's Cross Country Association, hereafter place our signatures certifying that we are official representatives of the Association, and we understand and will adhere to the rules and regulations as established in this Memorandum of Understanding.

Privately Funded Girl's Softball & Boy's Cross Country Questions and Answers – August 2008

Why would the school agree to add a new sport to the school during a time when the school struggles to fund the programs it has now? This proposal is for two new programs and is being privately funded outside of the schools normal funding sources. It is not intented to, and should not affect, funding of existing school programs.

Doesn't the city already have a softball program available for the girls? *Yes, there is a summer recreational program for girls but summer opportunities for high school girls in softball are very limited. Additionally this program would be a privately funded program during the spring of the school year*

Why isn't boys cross country a school sport when we already have cross country for the girls? At one point FHS did have a boys cross country team but it was cut in the mid-1980's as part of the school district's solution to meet the MHSA Ridgeway decision requirements as they pertained to equity and Title IX. According to the landmark Ridgeway decision the school was required to offer equal numbers of boys and girls sports. This proposal would allow it to come back only in conjunction with the addition of another girls sport.

Didn't the high school almost cut sports (golf) last year? Yes, cutting golf was a recommendation of the FHS Athletic Review Committee for the 2007-08 school year. There were several concerns with the program that were successfully addressed the spring of 2007 with the need for some private funding being one of those concerns.

Does the school require outside private funding for any other athletics program? *Yes, a group of golf supporters did agree to raise part of their funding from outside sources starting the 2007-08 school year, to address that concern raised at that time. Additionally, all current Fergus High athletic programs do receive the benefit of a substantial contribution of private funding from the Eagle Boosters. Last year that equated to a cash contribution of \$28,000 plus they purchased some additional equipment for various sports.*

Are any of the monies raised by this association going to the Lewistown Youth Baseball/Softball Association or/and Legion baseball? No. All of the funds raised for this privately funded effort would go to the district to support these new sports.

Won't gas prices affect the scheduling of all activities and has that concern been considered? *Gas prices are a huge concern of the school district and have been considered in the raising of enough private funds in this proposal to address this concern. Appropriate scheduling of events on the part of the school is also part of this concern.*

This proposal is for three years. Is the school committing to funding these programs after that? *No, the school district does not have any plans to take over funding after three years.*

Will the donors and other supporters of the proposal have any say over coaches and selection of team members? No. The operation of the programs will be entirely run by the school district, including hiring and firing of coaches, scheduling and selection of team members.

Are there hidden costs in this proposal? Not that we are aware of. The intent of the proposal is to privately fund these programs. We are aware of some minimal administrative duties that will have to take place but current budgeting and facilities concerns have been planned for. However, over time as programs evolve it is not unreasonable to believe there is an unforeseen expense that may come forward and the school and association will need to address it at that time.

What if the annual March 1 funding deadline is not met? *The memo of understanding for this proposal states: if funds are not deposited with the district on time (March 1 of each year) the programs for the ensuing year will be cut.*

How does Fergus High compare to the other schools our size in relation to the sports that are available to our student athletes? Class A schools on average have more athletic sports than Fergus High School. Right now we have 6 boys and 6 girls sports. The average school our size or larger has 7 of each, with a couple exceptions. Those with 6 or less sports are almost all smaller in size than FHS. In fact, most Class B schools larger than 215 students tend to also have softball and boys cross country available for their students.

It is rumored that softball tends to miss a lot of school. If this proposal is approved will the softball students miss too much school? Softball will be expected to meet the same expectations concerning attendance (number of days out of school competing) as the other sporting activities at FHS.

What facilities will the school be using for these sports? *Lewistown is fortunate to have an outstanding softball facility right now in the d'Autremont Complex. It is expected that it would be the primary practice and game facility for any high school softball program. Cross country does not have a specific facility per se. However, our track facility and area roads currently address practice needs and Pine Meadows Golf Course has been our traditional meet location. It is assumed that there will be not additional facility needs with the addition of boys cross country.*

Will existing athletic programs be able to remain viable and competitive if softball and boys cross country are added? We believe so. The goal of this proposal is to provide additional opportunities for our students and is hopeful that tennis, track, golf and football will continue to be the same strong, competitive programs they are today. Plus, one goal of this proposal is to involve more and different participation offerings for a wider variety of our high school students. In that process we feel there is a good chance that some of these opportunities will include students that currently are not participating in those competing sports.

Isn't soccer another sport the school does not offer and isn't there also support for it? *Yes, the school does not have either boy's or girl's soccer at this time and there is support for those programs, However, at this time there is no proposal for a privately funded soccer program and there are concerns in that there are only 4 Class A schools east of the divide that now have soccer programs with 13 of the 24 Class A schools offering soccer. In comparison, of the other 23 Class A schools there are 20 that already participate in softball and boy's cross country with another school considering starting those programs in the next year. A vast majority of larger Class B schools also offer softball and boys cross country while none offer soccer.*

What percentage of students participate in athletics now? The average percentage rate of student's participation in athletics since 1993-94 is 47%. However there has been a slight decline in that percentage in the last ten years. Conversely, student surveys in about the same time frame have shown considerable interest in softball, particularly. The school is looking at all reasons for the overall dip in participation levels but the interest for softball is certainly here.

Does this proposal address junior high level programs too? *No, but it is conceivable in the future that the district may consider boys cross country. However, all concerns relating to that addition must be reviewed; as equity and participation opportunities as required by Title IX must be addressed.*

Will this proposal start up both varsity and junior varsity teams for this first year? Yes and no. Yes in that it is very easy for individuals to compete on the varsity level for cross country while at the same time allowing for less experienced runners to compete at the junior varsity level. Concerning softball the

proposal is to initiate a junior varsity team for the upcoming school year with that team becoming a varsity level team for the 2009-2010 school year.

Why is the annual deadline for this proposal March 1st? *March 1st is the date that the school district already uses in completing work on scheduling and budgeting for the next school year. Additionally, it is a date that other schools use for efforts like this.*

Is the rental of the d'Autremont Complex included in this proposal? Yes.

How will the use of the d'Autremont Complex by the softball team impact the use of the complex by Youth Baseball/Softball? We assume there will be some impact to other users of the complex but are not sure how much of an impact there would be. Scheduling and other details for all groups would have to be worked out but this is not considered to be a major hurdle to this proposal.

Lewistown Public Schools 2008-AYP Determinations

The Lewistown Public Schools Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) determinations for the 2007-2008 school year indicate that neither our high school district nor our elementary district made AYP.

When considering that our school did not make AYP, please keep the following in mind. Under the No Child Left Behind Act, all schools are expected to be 100% proficient in reading and math by the year 2013-2014. OPI has established an annual measurable objective trajectory which is on page 7 of the Annual Yearly Progress Manual which is included in this packet.

The measurable objective for the 2006-2007 school year in reading was 74% and 51% in math. For the 2007-2008 school year, those measurable objectives jumped to 83% (a 9% increase) in reading and to 68% (a 17% increase) in math. Those measurable objectives will then stay at those percentages until the 2010-2011 school year when they again take significant increases to work toward the goal of 100% proficient in the year 2013-2014.

Below is a breakdown of our results by individual school. Please keep in mind that the grades that are tested and used to determine AYP are grades 3-8 and 10. Also included in this packet are copies of the status reports for both the elementary and high school districts and each individual school which are provided to our district by OPI. As you look at these status reports you will also see past AYP status.

Highland Park-Because Highland Park serves grades K-2 it is considered a feeder school and is not calculated into AYP determinations as an individual school.

Garfield-Garfield made AYP as a school.

Lewis and Clark-Lewis and Clark did not make AYP in both reading and math. The economically disadvantaged subgroup was 73% proficient in reading and 83% is the Annual Measurable Objective (AMO). The economically disadvantage subgroup was 57% in math and 68% is the AMO.

Lewistown Junior High-The junior high school did make AYP with what is called safe harbor. The safe harbor provision allows subgroups that fail to reach the AMO target to still make AYP if there was a 10% decrease in the percentage of students below proficient from the prior year. A detailed explanation of the safe harbor provision is on page 8 of the Adequate Yearly Progress Manual.

Fergus High School-The high school did not make AYP in the area of math. The all student and the white student subgroups did not make the AMO (83%) due to their scores of 54% and 55% respectively.

Where do we go from here? Included in this packet is an intervention summary. As you read this you will see that at this point, because this is our first year of not making AYP, it is up to us to address the areas where we need to improve. This is an item that our admin council will be discussing and determining strategies to improve our scores to reach those annual measurable objectives.

I think that we need to look at the big picture and understand that our staff and our students are working very hard to meet the AYP requirements. The increases in the AMO were significant this year and I think you will see that a number of districts around Montana will be struggling to make AYP due to this increase. These targets are lofty challenges for any school district to achieve but I am confident that our students and our staff will work hard and focus on the implementation of strategies to help us achieve these goals.
